





Jay Haas Captures 2008 Senior PGA Title


The field was impressive, including 15 major champions, with 9 Senior PGA titles, 8 Masters titles, 6 US Opens, 5 British Opens and, 2 PGA Championship titles between them; 7 Ryder Cup captains, and 6 Golf Hall of Fame members and representatives of 15 countries. The golf course was pristine, giving a tremendous challenge to the

players. The weather ended up to be perfect. Local golf hero, Jeff Sluman made his Senior Championship debut and put on an amazing performance for the huge crowds that followed him every day. Brian Whitcomb, President of the PGA of America, summed it up on Sunday, "It doesn't get any better than this! Thank you Oak Hill."

On Sunday afternoon, it was Jay Haas who won the right to hold the Alfred S. Bourne Trophy with a 7 over par, beating out Bernhard Langer on the last hole by one stroke. Bill Britton was the winning club professional with a 14 over par.

History of the Senior PGA Championship

The all-time great amateur player Bobby Jones, along with his good friend Alfred S. Bourne, organized the first Senior PGA Championship in 1937 at Augusta National Golf Club. Bourne who was a cofounder and benefactor of Augusta National donated the large silver Champions Cup still known as the Alfred S. Bourne Trophy.

The first two championships were played at Augusta National after which the venue moved to Florida, the home state for the Senior PGA until 2001. Most of the competitions have been at either PGA National at Dunedin, (1945 through 1962) or PGA National G.C. at Palm Beach Gardens, which has hosted a total of 26 Championships including a continuous string from 1982 through 2000. Beginning in 2001 the event has moved to some of the nations finest courses. The 2008 Championship at Oak Hill will be the most northerly site for this early season event coming exactly sixty years after the 1948 event won by Oak Hill C.C.'s own professional, Charlie McKenna.

Over the years, the champions have been some of the greatest names in golf. Jock Hutchison won the inaugural event and continued to "own" the tournament through the 1940's with two victories in 1937 and 1947 (at age 62) and eleven top 3 finishes, including six runner-ups. Another consistent force was Sam Snead who was sixtime champion ('64, '65, '67, '70, '72, '73) and had fifteen Top 10 finishes! In more recent times Hale Irwin has been a consistent winner taking the Bourne Trophy home in 1996, '97, '98 and '04.

Other notable winners of multiple Senior PGA Championships include some greats of the game including Gene Sarazen, Paul Runyan, Julius Boros, Don January, Arnold Palmer, Gary Player and Lee Trevino.

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




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Senior PGA Community Relations

the 2013 PGA Championship at Oak Hill Country Club. This effort is a first for the PGA, and all involved hope this will serve as a model to be used in other communities.


Our goal is to demonstrate that this was a successful program and it will continue to receive financial support from the community and the PGA Foundation beyond the 2013 PGA Championship.

Pro-Am Tournament

On Tuesday, for only the second time in the history of the Senior PGA, a Pro-Am tournament was held. Twenty-eight of the senior golfers paired up with 112 amateurs for a fun-filled, over 5 hour long round of golf on the East Course. The pros played their own ball and the four amateurs in the group used the best drive and then each player played their own ball. The winners of the event, with a 13-under par, were professional John Jacobs and amateurs Scott Seymour, J. Lowell Rolquin, Kevin Carter and Todd Lindenmuth. Local favorite Jeff Sluman played in a group that included his brother Brad Sluman and making it a real family affair, nephew Trevor Sluman served as Brad's caddie. The proceeds from the event went to the PGA Foundation, the part of the PGA of American dedicated to community service.



Hill of Fame Induction

On Wednesday of Championship Week, Jim Awtrey was inducted into Oak Hill's world-renowned Hill of Fame.

Awtrey, who retired in 2006 as Chief Executive Officer of The PGA of America, was honored for his years of service to the PGA. As CEO of the PGA, Awtrey was responsible for the development of many of the PGA's programs and policies which benefit PGA members and also all golfers.

Commenting on Jim Awtrey's induction, Hill of Fame Chairman Bill Reeves said: "Oak Hill played a significant role in one of Jim's greatest accomplishments -- the transformation of the Ryder Cup from an event barely noticed outside of the golf media, to a major international sporting event with a worldwide audience. In honoring Jim, it is our intention not only to recognize Jim's outstanding leadership as CEO of the PGA, but also to remind us of the importance to all golfers of the world's outstanding golf organizations, including The PGA of America.'

2008 PGA First Lady of Golf Award

On Wednesday evening, at the Kilbourn Hall of the Eastman School of Music, Carol Mann was honored with the PGA First Lady of Golf Award. This award, started in 1998 is given annually to a woman who has made significant contributions to the promotion of the game of golf. Previous awardees include Barbara Nicklaus, Judy Rankin, Nancy Lopez and Kathy Whitworth. The evening began with Mary Murphy, host of television's "So You Think You Can Dance" emceeing a program featuring dancers from another television show "Dancing with the Stars". Dancers included winners of that show, Edyta Sliwinska and Alec Mazo. The dancers wowed the audience with their impressive and beautiful dances. Brian Whitcomb, President of the PGA of American, then presented the award to Carol Mann.

Carol Mann, a native of Buffalo, NY, began playing golf at the age of 9. She has won 38 championships on the LPGA tour including the 1965 US Open. She was instrumental in advancing gender equity in promoting the passing of the Title IX Amendment of 1972. She has served as President of the LPGA and was inducted into the LPGA Hall of Fame in 1977 and the World Golf Hall of Fame in 1998. She was elected to PGA membership in 2002. One of the world's most respected golf teachers, hosting golf clinics nationwide, she has also served as a golf analyst on NBC Sports from 1977-1984



Thanks to everybody who contributed to another successful Major Championship at Oak Hill.




